Rotary Program from August 12, 2010

Social worker Frank Silva gave a report about the Group Study Exchange to South Africa. The group visited some 28 cities and their Rotary Clubs in 15 days. Frank told us that the South African clubs are very active, with each club undertaking as many as 30 projects!

He presented a film that was a montage of the highlights of their trip, which focused on South Africa and neighboring Botswana.

Mixing images of the 33 projects they visited with interviews of participants, the film painted a picture of a truly life-changing experience for all involved. The projects the group visited ran quite the gamut, with help for those affected by AIDS and services for women and children seeming to be the dominant themes. Others included water, school and sanitation projects.

The projects included a school and health center at Thlokomo, the Grace Health Center, a haven for abused or abandoned women and children, and the Pietersburg Rotary clean water project. The Garbarone Center, an after school program, started in 2005 with 6 kids grouped around a tree. It has grown into a center where thousands have participated.

The Group Exchange members spoke about their visit and how it opened their eyes, minds and hearts and helped them better understand the Rotary motto. They came away enriched and inspired to do more.

Frank's report was a vivid reminder of the global reach of Rotary, and how vital a role it plays in helping those in need. Indeed, "Service Above Self" is an ideal and a reality that knows no boundaries. He concluded with a heartfelt "Baie Dankei," Afrikaans for "Thank You."
